Children and families experience many transitions, large and small over the years. As a parent or medical provider for a young child with special health care needs you may be caught up in day-to-day details. However, planning for your child's future should not be postponed. With your child's medical provider, you can work as a team to look to that future.

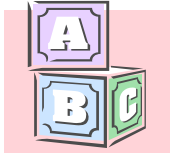
The Early Years

- Learn as much as you can about your child's special health care needs.
- Keep a record of your child's medical history including conditions, operations, medications and treatments (with dates, doctors and recommendations).
- Begin teaching your child about his/her health care needs.
- Begin teaching your child self-help skills for his/her independence and additional skills related to specific health care needs.
- Investigate services in your community.
- Join associations that represent your child's special need or illness.



As they Grow and Develop

- Assess your child's knowledge and perception of his/her health care needs. Build on their understanding.
- Help your child learn how to interact directly with nurses, doctors and therapists.
- Most children who qualify for SSI are also eligible for Medicaid. Check to see if either benefit is available for your child.
- Before your child transitions out of Early Intervention and/or Special Ed preschool, learn about other program options for his/her future educational needs.
- If your child has an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) or 504 Plan at school, attend the meetings. At an appropriate age, your child should be included in the meeting. Keep a copy of the plan that is developed to assure that it is followed.
- Actively support your child's interests and leisure activities.
